The application process for new agencies started early this spring. During the application process, we got to know each agency better:

Common Ground Community Building was established in 2018. They are supported by local churches and individuals. Partnering with United Way will help broaden their reach into our community helping more people reach the goal of financial independence. They have been lovingly called scrappy, and that adjective fits them perfectly. They are able to fill a void that other partner agencies have relied on to fill a need they couldn't on their own.

UPC Heartland - Gibbs Center for Independence is making sure all people have the opportunity to live, learn, engage in work and reach their full potential. They provide unique services for youth and adults in mid-Missouri not currently addressed by other United Way member agencies. This new partnership provides a continuation of services provided by Special Learning Center, an agency partner dedicated to providing comprehensive education and therapy services to children with developmental disabilities and delays; and

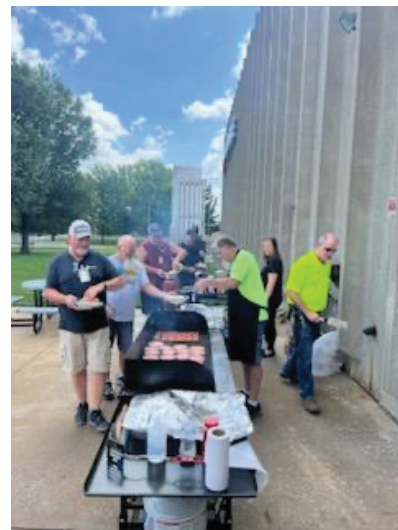

It is that donor that is ending his 10 hour shift who makes the decision to give an hour of his pay per month; and the child who learns to walk because of a United Way agency; the company that gives their employees a day off with pay to volunteer for United Way Days of Caring, and the restaurant that proudly displays a Dine United sign outside their door. I have seen CEO's dress up as Mario to reinforce our Super Mario Campaign theme; individuals cheering on their co-workers as they pedal their way to the finish line, barbeques, silent auctions, and mums being sold, all in the name of United Way. And while there is a lot of fun that goes on during the campaign, we know that every supporter, every fundraiser is helping to create bold, measurable change.

The Sneaker Project Benefits from a Carefully Woven Web

Pardon the creepy but timely Halloween arachnid metaphor, but The Sneaker Project and our United Way of Central Missouri partners are weaving quite a “web” to support those we serve. The reference is also timely as we prepare for our Fifth Annual Haunted Hustle 5K Walk/Run, always held the last Saturday in October on or before Halloween. There is still time to register for this year’s October 28th event at thesneakerproject.org. We must weave a web. A network to survive, to thrive and to best serve our communities. The Sneaker Project is a small but mighty agency whose mission is to provide new shoes for children and youth in Cole, Miller, Moniteau and Osage counties. They must attend a school program pre-k to 12th grade and meet free lunch financial eligibility requirements. We also serve private school students who meet the eligibility criteria and children in neighboring counties such as Callaway, Camden and Morgan who attend schools in our service counties. A challenging and unique reality of The Sneaker Project is that we do not have direct access to the children that we serve. We rely on the eyes and hearts of others to identify, confirm eligibility, share needs and distribute

shoes. These key folks are invaluable and include:

- Public and private school district staff members; including social workers, school nurses, counselors and teachers
- County health nurses and staff
- United Way and partner agency staff members

We currently work with six area partners. 2023 agency partners include Little Explorers Discovery Center, The Boys and Girls Club, El Puente Hispanic Ministry, Special Learning Center, YMCA Child Development Center and Catholic Charities. Others may be working behind the scenes with school districts to secure shoes for the young people that they serve. We are currently communicating with Central Missouri Foster Care & Adoption Association and hope to lend support to that agency. We will continue to reach out and welcome discussion with additional organizations.

Each school, county and agency personalizes their approach to access needs and to distribute shoes using methods that work best for them. They maintain confidentiality for all that we serve; we know sweet faces and names as numbers. But it’s okay and necessary.

As a small agency, the “web” of the United Way is our lifeline. Beyond annual financial support, we have received 3 Community Support Grants in the last 3 years. The first helped us create an independent office after losing our beloved and first Executive Director Lorie Smith, who had served 4 agencies through a single office, address and supplies. The second and third grants were provided for unexpected growth in Miller County in 2022 and 2023. The United Way connected us with two additional grants to pilot sock distribution and to assist with increased needs at The Boys and Girls Club with the

expansion through the Sadowski Center.

Again, as a small agency with a part-time Executive Director, The Sneaker Project thrives on United Way support that extends beyond financial. The United Way staff and its Fund Allocation process and volunteers provide networking opportunities, brainstorm growth/goal development strategies and model fiscal responsibility. We work as a team... sometimes coaching, sometimes cheerleading and always celebrating success.

Besides regular monthly Agency Council Meetings, the United Way has provided training in areas such as Board Development, identifying and understanding addiction and will even provide a new social media program for partner agencies in early 2024.

The beauty of our network extends beyond support and networking. We can respond to needs with the certainty that requests are real, vetted and not a duplication of the work of another service provider. The Sneaker Project will not provide shoes if another agency does so. We want to be good stewards of precious resources.

While sneakers do not meet the critical food, shelter or safety needs that other United Way partner agencies provide, The Sneaker Project does add to the foundation of support. The benefits of new, proper-fitting shoes include:

- Enhancing the health of children;
- Providing injury prevention;
- Improving participation in physical education classes and related activities;
- Boosting self-esteem;
- And assisting families. Shoe needs cannot always be predicted due to growth or circumstances. Wide, narrow or large sizes (men’s size 16 is our record) are expensive and more difficult to find.

The Sneaker Project bargain shops and seeks to purchase shoes that are unique to each child for function and need. We are proud to be a United Way partner agency, and proud to serve the central Missouri community!

unique services outside the mission of Capitol Projects, an agency that strives to provide meaningful employment for adults with special needs.

The Gibbs Center for Independence provides adult day services focusing on independence through technology, supported living assistance, respite services, employment training and placement and more. United Way of Central Missouri believes strongly in the services offered by UCP Heartland and for the past two summers provided Community Support Grants so youth ages 10-18 with special needs could attend a summer camp to provide opportunities to learn and practice social and life skills along with making lasting memories. This camp also made it possible for parents to work while their children attended camp, which is certainly an added benefit.

During the application process, Kevin Litt, Vice President of Development, shared that The Gibbs Center for Independence is considering expansion of their Autism services and a Traumatic Brain Injury program—all much needed services in our community.

Catholic Charities and United Way got to know, and gain even more respect for

each other after the tornado ravaged our community in 2019. United Way staff stood shoulder to shoulder with their team to provide immediate support to tornado survivors, and worked with them to form the Cole and Miller County Long Term Recovery Committee which just helped our last disaster survivor move into his new home this summer - four years since the EF-3 tornado hit our community. United Way provided a Disaster Grant to Catholic Charities after the tornado and provided additional assistance to flash flooding victims in 2020. As a result of our financial support, Catholic Charities was able to begin immediate case management services to those affected by these tragedies. These services were instrumental in bringing assistance to disaster survivors allowing them to move forward with their lives more quickly.

United Way was proud to partner with Catholic Charities in moments of disaster, and we are equally excited to work with them going forward to support their First Choice Food Pantry.

The First Choice Food Pantry distributed more than \$500,000 in food in 2022—serving over 4,000 people in its first year. To date the pantry is on pace to far exceed 2022’s

numbers, making it evident there is a great need for food distribution in our community. Those in our community experiencing food insecurity can shop at the First Choice Food Pantry with dignity and receive high quality food for themselves and their families. We are excited to support this agency and the pantry to assist Catholic Charities in serving even more families to lessen the burden of food insecurity in our community.

So why do people like Doug and Cassandra and Lee give so freely of their time? They do it because they know the work of the 29 member agencies of United Way rely on them to help meet their missions. If you’ve wondered if making a contribution to United Way makes a difference; I assure you it does. There are people in our community that just wouldn’t get the help they need without the generous support of our citizens. Addressing The Increasing Need For Diapers

First Chance for Children (FC4C) is a nonprofit community organization that provides early childhood programs and family resources to foster healthy outcomes for children and families throughout central Missouri. The goals of the organization are to increase school readiness and reduce child abuse and neglect by providing research based, trauma informed services to high-risk families.

First Chance for Children has four primary programs that provide a comprehensive approach addressing the needs of entire systems associated with at risk children. Each of our programs fit together to provide complete, wrap-around support for families.

Lend and Learn is a free and fun program that supports children ages 0-5 and their families to grow essential skills through play. There are two indoor locations with regular play time hours in Columbia and Centralia. Families may borrow toys to extend their play and learning at home. Our Columbia location has an outdoor playground. Additionally, we offer a variety of play events and activities.

Babies are at greatest risk of child abuse and death because of sleep issues during their first year of life. First Chance for Children’s Safe C.R.I.B.S. program provides a safe crib and the information families need to safely put their child to bed and deal with sleep-related issues. The crib is delivered to the family home and is followed by five additional home visits that focus on child abuse and neglect prevention and child development information.

Baby U is our home visitation program. This program equips parents with child development education, parenting support and tangible items to improve family well-being and kindergarten readiness.

Finally, our Baby Bags Diaper Bank program is the primary diaper bank in central Missouri. We serve 13 counties throughout central Missouri and distribute thousands of diapers monthly to families in need.

The United Way of Central Missouri Community Support Grant we received this year allows us to provide our Baby Bags Diaper Bank program to families with children ages 0-5 in Cole, Moniteau, Osage, Miller and Southern Callaway counties. This program is based on trauma-informed practices and is designed to strengthen families by developing protective factors and providing necessities in times of need. This basic need continues to grow and the cost of diapers and wipes continues to increase. The cost of diapers has increased 39% since the pandemic. There has been an increase in the need for formula, hygiene products and household goods. Diaper need is a growing problem not only in our community but across our country. A clean diaper means a happy baby, but according to new data from The National Diaper Bank Network Diaper Check 2023: Diaper Insecurity among U.S. Children and Families, 1 in 2 U.S. families cannot afford enough diapers to keep their infant or child clean, dry and healthy. These babies are more vulnerable to painful rashes and urinary tract infections and have more trips to the doctor. 3 in 5 parents miss work or school because they can’t afford the diapers required to leave their baby in childcare. Clean diapers are a necessity of every baby and toddler. Without clean diapers babies are exposed to potential

health risks and toxic stress; mothers are at risk for increased maternal depression; parents are unable to access childcare - which requires a daily supply of diapers; and parents miss work or school.

Economic hardship and financial distress can have devastating effects on families. In tough economic times such as these, many families lose their jobs, homes, cars, belongings and more. Families are struggling to meet their basic needs. By providing these simple items, we promote stress reduction and child abuse prevention. These “Baby Bags” give families items to alleviate immediate stressors. Diapers and wipes are distributed directly to families in need, through a partner agency or through one of Baby Bags Diaper Drive-thrus. Diaper Drive-thrus allow us to distribute diapers at a central location in the community to reduce barriers to access. Families complete a short form so that we can collect household information and demographics. The Baby Bags program is open to families with children ages 0-5 in Cole, Moniteau, Osage, Miller and Southern Callaway counties through this United Way Community Support Grant.

In 2022, First Chance for Children’s Baby Bags Diaper Bank distributed 14,000 packages of diapers. This year,

we are projected to distribute over 28,000 packages of diapers. We would not be able to provide these basic necessities without the help of the United Way of Central Missouri.

So, how can you help? Donate! We accept donations of diapers and wipes. We take open packages of diapers as well. You can host a diaper drive with your church group or Scout troop! 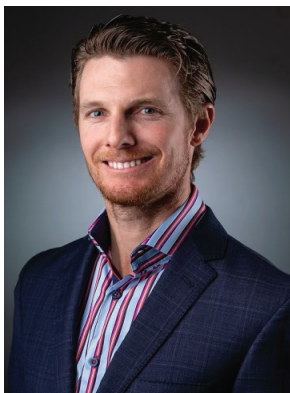

Providing Fulfillment Through GIVE 5

The Program
The GIVE 5 program is a volunteer program that serves to connect retirees with meaningful volunteer opportunities through local nonprofits that best fit their skill sets and passions. GIVE 5 is made up of 4 program days over 4 weeks, followed by a graduation celebration in the 5th week. A typical program day starts at our community room where we hear from a community speaker who gives their take on our community focus, strengthening families. We then board a bus and visit two nonprofits, break for lunch and visit 3 more nonprofits. These visits allow for a 'behind-the-scenes' look with a 45-minute presentation and facility tour, that typically also includes a testimonial from a client being served or a volunteer who has felt the impact of the organization from their volunteer experience. During these presentations, participants learn about the most challenging problems that our community faces and uncover ways they can be a part of the solution. After participants have had their behind-the-scenes look at each organization, they are encouraged to choose one or more nonprofits to 'give 5' hours a month to in volunteer service at the graduation celebration.

The GIVE 5 program began in Springfield, Missouri where Greg Burris and Cora Scott saw a need to help retirees transition from their 'work life' to enjoying retirement and making it more fulfilling. Current retirees and the coming wave of baby boomers have a variety of skills and assets – experience, expertise, financial resources, a desire to give back to their community – and for the first time in their lives, time. This program was designed and created upon one central assumption: people are good. And once people see the need, they want to help. The GIVE 5 program is now in 14 different cities spread out among 4 states!

The GIVE 5 program in Jefferson City has been made possible through a grant that Aging Best, the Central Missouri Area Agency on Aging, received from the state. Aging Best asked the United Way of Central Missouri to partner with them in the fall of 2022 and we kicked off our first class together in March of 2023. My co-facilitator, Jody Doppelt, is the Volunteer Services Manager at Aging Best. Together, Jody and I lead the participants through the program in hopes that each retiree will find a connection with a nonprofit that has volunteer opportunities available that best fit their passions and talents. It is our goal to

ensure a fun, memorable experience for the participants that include at least one 'aha moment' per day, while also increasing awareness and empathy around the challenges our community faces.

Success
The first GIVE 5 class in Jefferson City was held in March of 2023. We had 12 participants in the inaugural class and many of them are making huge impacts at the nonprofits of their choice! We recently had a small reunion in September where we had the opportunity to gather, eat donuts and drink coffee while sharing volunteer stories and feedback about the program. One of the questions I asked them was, "Did going through the GIVE 5 program increase your sense of responsibility to help improve the community?" The answer was an overwhelming yes! All participants also agreed the best part of the program was getting to tour the inside of the agencies and hear from the individuals who have been impacted by the nonprofit or who have been served by the nonprofit.

Our second class was held in June of 2023 and we had 13 participants in this class. Chip Webb – a participant in the class – shared, "I have had the privilege of volunteering for the United Way of Central Missouri for several years, including being on the Board of Directors and a year as Board Chair. I retired from Ameren Missouri in February of 2023, just as the GIVE 5 program was kicking off. Even though I felt like I had a pretty good perspective on the United Way and the agencies they serve, I saw an opportunity to learn more and figure out

where to expand my volunteer opportunities. My experience in the 2nd cohort of GIVE 5 was amazing! I met and interacted with a lot of wonderful people in my cohort, while learning more than I could ever imagined in our visits to the amazing agencies that support people in need in this community. Since graduating from GIVE 5, I have become a member of the "Tuesday Crew" at Habitat for Humanity and, along with fellow GIVE 5 graduate Mike Grefrath, been able to support ongoing building maintenance needs at the Rape and Abuse Crisis Service. I truly feel blessed to have been given these opportunities and am proud to be able to do my part in supporting the United Way and the agencies they work with."

Upcoming
We have a 3rd class and 4th class in the works! Class 3 will be held in November of 2023 and Class 4 will be held in February of 2024. Our fingers are crossed that there will be a Class 5 in the Jefferson City area in April of 2024, but that is still to be determined.

Through the GIVE 5 program, there is a chance to do so much good in our community. I truly believe that through volunteerism, we don't just have the opportunity to make a change at the nonprofits we volunteer with, but we have the opportunity to feel change within ourselves – more gratitude, more compassion, more understanding, more joy.
